## IPM statement

It is the goal of Saddleback Valley Unified School District to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

To respond to pest control problems efficiently while reducing the negative impact of pest control chemicals.

(Education Code Section 16711)

(Education Code Section 17610.5)
